## Oakwood clears first hurdle to build hospital in Canton

No one can doubt Oakwood's persis-

The Dearborn-based health care system has moved a step closer in its multi-year quest to build a medical facility in the southwest part of the township.

The Canton Planning Commission has pushed forward Oakwood's plans to construct a facility on the west side of Beck Road just north of Michigan Avenue.

In recommending that the proposal go before the township board, the commission has placed several conditions on the plans, including the expansion of the setback between the facility and neighboring homes from 100 feet to 120 feet.

Canton Community Planner Jeff Goulet said other conditions include the creation of an advisory council, which will include township residents, and determining the health care provider's responsibility in paying for any traffic improvements mandated by Wayne County and the Michigan Department of Transportation.

The recommendation to proceed is a victory for Oakwood, which faced strong opposition from homeowners the two

previous times it went before the planning commission. In 2006 and 2007, Oakwood proposed building a new facility on the northwest corner of Beck and Geddes. Hundreds of homeowners came out against the project expressing concerns about traffic and property values.

Oakwood's newest rendition of its proposal could go before the board May 13. Residents of Meadow Villages, the subdivision which sits opposite of the proposed medical site on Beck Road, have mixed feelings about the project.

Letkemann and the Wayne County Prosecutor's office for Letkemann's guilty plea to second-degree murder, sentenced the 18-year-old former Churchill High School student from Westland to 20-30 years in prison.

Letkemann was also sentenced to 3-10 years for mutilation of a corpse. The sentences will run concurrently. A felony murder charge against Letkemann was dismissed.

After saying he couldn't "find a reason

for myself" why he didn't walk away from the murder, Letkemann apologized to Sorensen's family, who forgave him during their statements to the court.

## Attorneys spar as board approves temple plan

Frustrated over what he called an ordinance trumping common sense, Chuck Davis offered a simple "congratulations" to attorney Bryan Amann after the Canton Township board unanimously approved the plan to rebuild the Hindu Temple.

"I'm disappointed," said Davis, who lives south of the temple's Cherry Hill Road location. "I thought there would be more latitude for common sense, but the decision was driven by the ordinance. But I'm not bitter or mad — (the board) did what they thought was right."

In handing down its decision Tuesday, one homeowner muttered the word, "Unbelievable," while Amann, who represents the temple, said the lawyer for a group of dissenting homeowners was trying to "twist and contort" the township's ordinance. In return, attorney Thomas

McGraw, who represents 32 homeowners near the temple, said Amann has a "flippant attitude" regarding the request to move the temple.

McGraw, who insisted the concern was not over the temple itself but its placement, told the board that when he met with Amann

earlier this month, he was offered a compromise of moving the worship center 100 feet north and 30 feet to the east. When he failed to respond to the offer within the requested 48 hours, McGraw said the temple no longer wanted to discuss the building's location.

Referencing the planning commission's approval of the project in February, McGraw pointed out that when a commissioner asked Amann if the building could be moved, he said no.

"Are they allowed to change their minds?" McGraw said. "Do the planning commission's questions mean anything?"


McGraw then asked the board to approve the project, but with the conditions that the building is moved. Carol Rosati, special counsel to the township, cautioned against McGraw's request.

"I'm having some difficulty with adjacent property owners redesigning development plans," she said, noting that the proposal is in compliance with all ordinance requirements.

After the board's approval of the plans, McGraw said the homeowners have the right to present their case to the township's zoning board of appeals and are considering their options.





## Fire rips through Canton home

The Canton Fire Department is still investigating a late night blaze that ripped through a twostory home on North Pointe

Canton Fire Chief Michael Rorabacher played down reports that the home "exploded" as premature but said the damage to the twostory, single-family home is extensive.

'We don't have damage estimates, but it's significant," he said. "The home isn't livable."

Rorabacher said the homeowners are believed to on vacation.

"We are still trying to get a hold of them," he said. At the house, which sits just east of Beck Road, several windows have been boarded up and the charred frame of the roof

above the foyer has been exposed.

Rorabacher said the flames were most intense in the home's basement.

Nardeep Bains lives a few homes away from the destroyed house and said she's met the homeowners in passing.

"They are a nice family," she said. "Luckily, they weren't home."

## Pioneer student faces expulsion for copycat bomb threat 'hoax'

A Pioneer Middle School student has been suspended after admitting to writing a message on a boys' bathroom wall that indicated a bomb would go off at the school.

Pioneer Principal Phil Freeman said the unidentified student was in the office at 10:30 a.m. Monday morning and by 11 a.m. he confessed to the writing on the wall.

"The number one thing we can do at Pioneer to ensure the safety of students is to know our children well," said Freeman. "The initial investigation centered on the handwriting, and by know our kids we were able to question him. We were able to focus our investigation and get the child to confess to the hoax.

"He gave us information on when and where he did it, and gave us information no one else was given," he said. "When we asked 'why,' he said he read about the incident at Central (Middle School) and wanted to see if he could get away with it."

A similar threat was found written on a boys' bathroom wall at Central April 3. The same kind of precautions were taken by Plymouth and Michigan State police; however, the person responsible for that incident has not been identified.

Freeman said the Pioneer student has been suspended and faces expulsion.

"He caused a situation that could have been worse," said Freeman. "We want to send a strong message to him and other students this won't be tolerated.

Freeman said the message was discovered after school on Friday by another student. "We did a cursory check of the building

Friday, and the State Police went through the school with the dogs on Sunday," said Freeman. "They didn't find anything and we secured the building overnight. "We had only two doors open for students

hen they arrived for class their hacknacks were checked and they were immediately sent to their homerooms," he said.

Plymouth Township Police Chief Tom Tiderington said school officials took the necessary precautions.

"The school did all the right things to ensure the safety of students and to make sure it doesn't happen again," Tiderington

## Canton rec trails get boost

You might say these are the best of times for the supporters of recreation trails in Canton.

Canton officials are nearly ready to unveil the first phase of the Lower Rouge Recreation Trail that is being built along the Lower Rouge River just north of Michigan Avenue. Canton is planning a grand opening of the trail (and trail head) on River Day, which will take place June 7. The first phase of the trail will be about 2 1/2 miles long, from the ITC corridor (near Lilley) to just east of Sheldon Road.

Ultimately, plans are for the trail to connect the area around the Summit near Canton Center Road all the way to the recreational trail that runs along I-275, which is in the midst of current and planned repairs.

Canton recently received some good news from the state to help them finish the trail sooner rather than later. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources Trust Fund has awarded Canton a \$350,000 grant to build six foot bridges that will span the river along the trail.

According to Bob Belair, a township engineer who is overseeing much of the trail project, Canton Leisure Services has about \$200,000 in additional matching funds to go towards the project. In addition to the bridges, which he said would most likely be constructed sometime next year, the project will also include interpretive signs and possible fishing areas.

In the meantime, progress is also being made in cleaning up Canton's portion of the I-275 bike path. Last weekend, Canton and a group of volunteers cleaned up trash along the trail. On Saturday, a group called Friends of the I-275 Bike Path will hold another clean-up. According to the group's leader, Dave Duffield, volunteers are needed to help trim back brush, scrape weeds out of pavement cracks, and other general

The group will meet at 8:30 a.m. at the Holiday Inn Express, 3950 S. Lotz (Lotz and Michigan Avenue) at the east most end of the

trail near Michigan Avenue.

"When you ride through the area in the summer, it feels like you are riding through a field of sugar cane," he said.

Duffield has been working with the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), which owns the trail, to improve it. The trail was built in the 1970s and is need of work. He said MDOT has plans to repave the trail in phases.

The trail runs about 40 miles, he said, from Farmington Hills down to Monroe.

'This is an important resource," Duffield said of the trail. "With gas prices surging towards \$4 a gallon, nothing would make me happier than to see the bike path as busy as I-275 itself. I try to tell people all the time, you can use this trail to get to work. I do it every day. It can be done."

Duffield said there will be a few bonuses for volunteers on Saturday. A pizza lunch will be provided, and massage therapy students from Schoolcraft College will be offering free massages to volunteers. There will also be several raffles, including a raffle for a three-month YMCA membership.

And, if you're looking for some star power, Duffield said Detroit Free Press columnist Mitch Albom will also be on hand helping out volun-

### Investors, be wary of practices

ast week I watched a network news program which 🗯 ran an exposé concerning the sale of investment products. The product highlighted was the sale of annuities but in effect, it could have applied to just about any investment.

The gist of the exposé was that investment products were sold merely to generate a commission as opposed to doing what was appropriate for the investor. The show highlighted

the deceptive sales tactics that financial salespeople will use in order to convince someone to invest.

The deceptive sale tactics included misrepresentations about the product

and in some cases outright lies. Unfortunately, the exposé was not an isolated case but rather something that happens frequently. That is why it is important for investors to be educated and always on guard.

The unethical sales practices take on many different forms. They were creative but at the same time meant to deceive investors. For example, one story showed that in order to gain credibility, the financial salesperson co-authored a book. However, the financial salesperson never authored the book. Another practice designed to give the salesperson credibility was to claim they were interviewed on a national radio show. The implication is they must have some expertise to allow them to be on a national radio show. First, it is important to recognize that the radio show they used was nothing more than an "infomercial."

I do want to mention that my radio show is not an infomercial. I have never and will never charge anyone to be interviewed on my show. In addition, unlike many weekend radio shows, I do not buy air time for my show.

Government regulators do not have the resources to prevent unscrupulous sales tactics. It's up to you and me. Avoid seminars and sales presentations that are meant to sell a product as opposed to educating investors. In addition, before you buy, make sure you know what the surrender fees are and how long.

## Pay equity not just a woman's issue

A number of organizations brought their message of pay equity to Lansing Tuesday for Equal Pay Day.

"Pay equity is a simple matter of fairness and justice," said Mickey Edell of Canton, state president for the American Association of University Women. Edell moderated a press conference to bring the pay equity message to the forefront. The event is nationwide.

She noted women in 2001 with a bachelor's degree age 25-34 earned \$32,238 a year compared to \$42,292 for men, a 24 percent gap. April 22 represents the day into the next year women must work "to achieve equity with men," said Edell, a Plymouth-Canton schools speech and language pathologist. "So almost four months."

The organizers gave members of the House of Representatives and Senate in Lansing cookies with a bite out of them (a cutter was used) to demonstrate women's pay shortcomings. Organizers also wore red, to show women are in the red.

"I find that younger people, and women, are particularly surprised" pay equity's still an issue, Edell said. She's met with women engineers who realize their pay lags compared to male colleagues.

In Edell's field of education, pay is determined by a union contract so there's not as much disparity.

The Lansing press conference in the Rotunda Room included AAUW, the National Organization for Women, Women Work, the Pay Equity Network, Michigan Women's Commission, and the Business and Professional Women.

There's been legislative action at both the federal and state levels. In Michigan, both SB 417, introduced by Sen. Liz Brater, D-Ann Arbor, and HB 4625, introduced by Rep. Joan Bauer, D-Lansing, have been referred to committee. Organizers hope that the press conference on Tuesday encourages legislators

AAUW has a long history of involvement in pay equity beginning with its 1913 report on United States Civil Service job classifications and compensation in Washington, D.Ĉ., Edell said. AAUW has supported federal pay equity legislation since it was first introduced in 1945.

In 2007, AAUW released 'Behind the Pay Gap," a report that indicates that one year out of college women earn only 80 percent as much as their male colleagues and 10 years after graduation earn only 69 percent as much. She noted women earn only 67 cents to a man's dollar in Michigan, ranking near the bottom in equity nationwide.

"It's not just an issue for women but it's an issue for families," Edell said. "Obviously if income is less there's less to invest in the future.'

The Business and Professional Women organization's also been active in pay equity for years, said Marilyn Alimpich of Plymouth, secretary of Plymouth BPW. "If somebody isn't earning a full wage, it's hard to pay for things," said Alimpich, who recently retired from the Social Security Administration after a 34-year career.

There are a lot of single women, many with children, Alimpich said, and women's Social Security earnings are impacted by disparity. Plymouth BPW has a lot of retirees now, but they remain concerned about younger women.

"This is an issue that's been going on for all our working lives," Alimpich said. "It's still a fight to be won."


Alimpich's full career was in government, so she faced less disparity. She has a 24-year-old niece wrapping up college and would like to talk in depth with her to see how she perceives the issues. Title IX took away the disparity in high school and college sports for women, she noted. "Some of them may not be cognizant of what awaits them in the workforce," she said of younger women.

Sen. Hillary Clinton's presidential bid is a good sign, Alimpich believes, but women still have a long way to go to achieve equity.



"I can't find enough words to say how sorry I am for what I did," Letkemann said, "I'd like to thank the Sorensens for their forgiveness. I'm grateful I'm going to have a second chance."

The forgiveness came during tearful statements by both James and Kimberly Sorensen, the parents of the victim. Kimberly Sorensen, who noted her son's penchant for thinking of others ahead of himself often led him "to make foolish decisions," called the months since his death "surreal."

"The enormity of how my life will change has yet to strike me," she said. "Those who truly loved Dan will always love him, and they'll miss him for as long as they live. My two best friends are (husband) Jim and Dan, and one of them has been taken from me for the rest of

James Sorensen told of the last father-son moment he shared with Daniel, weeks

before his death, when the son took the father for a ride in his new truck. Daniel would always be, James Sorensen said, "my little boy."

"I'll never see that big ol' grin that would light up my soul," James said. "He is gone, and the hole in my heart is so big, it will never be filled."

Kimberly Sorensen pledged her forgiveness to Letkemann, and her husband thanked him for the testimony that ultimately helped convict Orlewicz.

"It would be easy to justify hating (Letkemann), and I don't think anyone would fault me, but I don't hate him," James Sorensen said. "In an act of courage that will send him to prison for many years, (Letkemann) stepped forward to accept responsibility for what he did. I thank you, Alex, and I forgive you."

Letkemann's father, Pete, took exception to an insinuation from Berry that Letkemann and other teenagers testified during Orlewicz's trial in order to get a deal from prosecutors. The elder

Letkemann said his son is truly remorseful, even if he couldn't voice it in court.

"Alex thought anything he said would sound lame," Pete Letkemann said. "The Sorensens are amazing in their forgiveness. It means a lot. Alex always wanted a shot at redemption, and now he's going to get it."

Prosecutors agreed to the plea deal in exchange for Letkemann's testimony against Orlewicz, the Plymouth Township teenager convicted last week of killing and beheading Sorensen, then disposing of his body in a Northville Township field and tossing his head in the Rouge River.

Orlewicz, 18, faces a mandatory life sentence without possibility of parole when he's sentenced May 12. Assistant prosecutor Robert Moran, who prosecuted Orlewicz, said Letkemann's testimony was a key element in Orlewicz's conviction.





## **Committee's reversal** on supervisor's pay is certainly puzzling

After an internal committee looking at the compensation for Canton's elected officials reversed course on its recommendation for the supervisor's pay, we can't help but scratch our heads.

The committee, which includes Trustees Todd LaJoy and Todd Caccamo, Clerk Terry Bennett, Finance Director Rick Eva and Executive Director John Santomauro, originally recommended lowering the supervisor's pay from \$127,073 to \$108,669; the salary for the clerk and treasurer from \$103,070 to \$98,700; and salary for trustees from \$12,537 to \$12,000.

When the committee first presented its recommendations to the full board of trustees in early April, it was met with some criticism, especially about the supervisor's pay. Supervisor Tom Yack, who is retiring at the end of the year, said he agreed there should be some reduction, but reducing the position's salary by 13 percent was too much. He also said six merit positions, including fire chief and community engineer, would draw a higher salary than the supervisor if the recommendation were adopted.

The supervisor is the CEO of the organization, moderator of board meetings, the community's chief spokesperson and representative at a variety of community events. The responsibility and time commitment of the supervisor's position overshadows that of any other professional or elected position," Yack wrote in response to the committee.

Yack was also backed up by Trustee Melissa McLaughlin.

On April 15, the committee again came before the board and decided to change its recommendation on the supervisor's pay, bringing it up to \$115,366.

The reversal, as well as this whole process, begs a few questions. Did the committee cave in to Yack? If Yack and the other board members agree there should be a reduction in salaries for elected officials, why have they consistently voted to increase their own salaries, including a 3-percent increase less than six months ago?

From our standpoint, it sure looks like the committee caved in to political pressure.

For the record, we don't disagree with Yack's reasoning that the supervisor is the "CEO" of the township. But it must be remembered that under Yack's leadership over the course of the last two decades, more and more responsibility to run the day-to-day operations of township government was turned over to department heads and staff, and the township has attracted some very capable professionals to fill those positions. Yet to then turn around and use them as the benchmark for your own salary, seems, to borrow a word from Yack, "illogical."

It's not like Canton officials haven't had their share of raises in recent years. Yack's salary alone has risen from \$88,862 in 2001 to \$127,073 for 2008.

So its not surprising the committee decided it wanted to look at reducing salaries. But we thought the whole point was to re-examine salaries, to take the politics out of it, and base the recommendations on a formula. Now the whole process looks pretty arbitrary.

"This is what we thought the public could stomach," Caccamo said about the reversal.

The public or the powers that be?

### Going green doesn't have to cost towns a lot of green

"It's not easy bein' green," as Kermit the Frog used to sing. That's why we applaud local municipalities that have taken steps to protect the environment.

Some, like Berkley and Ferndale, have established volunteer groups to identify ways they can conserve energy. increase recycling, reduce greenhouse gases and adopt other environmentally friendly practices.

These committees, among other tasks, are charged with finding green initiatives that cost little to implement, such as installing bicycle racks and recycling bins for plastic water bottles in downtown areas.

Being green can be expensive, at least initially. With declining state revenue sharing and property tax revenue, many communities don't have money for costly changeovers. Researching green initiatives also takes time, which short-staffed city or township departments don't have.

Citizen committees who care about the environment do the work for free, and they can recommend a range of green initiatives from those that cost nothing to those that are worth saving for.

Other communities don't have committees, but they're still environmentally responsible.

It isn't easy being green — but it's the right thing to do. And local municipalities leading the way are doing it at little or no cost.



## Recall efforts equal nothing more than politics as usual

hink Michigan legislative politics are all sweetness and light these days, following last year's partisan bruising budget wars?

If so, you might want to take a look at what's going on in the 17th state House District. It consists of Redford Township, southeast Livonia and north Dearborn Heights. That's the turf that the current Speaker of the House, Andy Dillon, calls home. But it's also the site of an increasingly ugly campaign to recall the 46-year-old Democrat from his seat.

Words like "thug," "liar" and "criminal" are flying around freely, and wads of money are being spent. The recall, one of several mounted by the Michigan Taxpayers Alliance, is supposedly in response to Dillon's vote last fall to increase the state income tax to overcome a billion-dollar-plus deficit in the state's budget.

Initially, six representatives and four senators, including both Republicans and Democrats, were targeted for

removal.

But it now looks as though Dillon is the main focus of the recall movement. That, in turn, raises the prospect that the right of recall is being manipulated for purely partisan purposes. The Michigan Constitution says that valid signatures of 25 percent of registered voters who voted in the last election for governor are enough to force recall of a sitting lawmaker.

In the case of the 17th district, that comes to around 8,720 signatures, due by May 1. Recall advocates are led by former state Rep. Leon Drolet, now a Macomb County commissioner, and Rose Bogaert, of Dearborn Heights. She is chairwoman of the Wayne County Taxpayers Association and Taxpayers to Recall Andy Dillon

Bogaert says her group wants to collect at least 10,000 signatures, to make sure it has a cushion; some names are always certain to be invalid or duplicates. According to three sources (who asked for anonymity for fear of harassment), the pro-recall people started out paying \$2 for every signature. That went to \$4 each, then \$6. Now the going rate appears to be \$10 per name.

That's a lot of dough! If they're aiming for 10,000 signatures, that's going to cost a cool \$100,000, not counting other expenses like postage (fliers have been mailed to all houses in the district), newspaper ads, office and legal expenses.

That's big money. All things considered, I wouldn't be surprised if total campaign costs come to more than \$250,000.

So where's all this money coming from? Democrats and Dillon supporters talk darkly about far right-wing, out-of-state moneybags. Lending credence to this suspicion is the fact that the national anti-tax guru — Washington-based Grover Norquist, president of Americans for Tax Reform — is a member of Drolet's

Two long-term Lansing lobbyists, who wouldn't go on the record, told me big GOP money is behind the effort, "because it will be a big feather in their hat if they knock off the Democratic Speaker of the House." They also mention House Minority Leader, Rep. Craig DeRoche, R-Novi, although he denies being involved.

When I asked Bogaert directly about the money, she wouldn't tell me. "Companies, individuals," she said. "You can't increase business taxes by 22 percent and expect them to be happy about it."

But why won't she tell me who's paying? "It would give our opponents a leg up on us."

Drolet says his campaign has more than 300 donors, almost all of them from Michigan. With the fog machines turned on full blast, I expect we'll never know for sure where the real money is coming from.

I'm also told that petition circulators are being devious, asking voters if they "want to reduce their taxes" by signing, or even "cut gas prices." One source claimed circulators said the petitions supported stem cell research and universal health care. For the record, Michigan election law (168.957) requires signatures not be obtained "through fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation."

One man named Hugh H. Jordan III wrote a letter to the editor of the *Redford Observer* that said, "One of the petition signature collectors came to my door a few days ago and said to me, 'Sign this petition to lower your taxes.' Thankfully, I knew that the petition was actually intended to recall Speaker of the House Andy Dillon, and I declined to sign."

But even though there may be a bull's green pipped.

But even though there may be a bull's-eye pinned to his behind, Dillon is fighting back. He's dispatched people to shadow petition circulators. "I feel bad for the folks in my district," Dillon told me. "If petitions were being gathered based on what I truly did, that would be fine. But they're not.

"And there's an election this November; if people don't like what I've done in office, they can chuck me out then and there." Without spending a pile on special elections, either.

What he didn't add is that even if he wins, he'll be gone forever two years after that, thanks to the curse of term limits.

Term limits are bad enough, but I've always thought that threatening to recall elected lawmakers because they cast a certain vote is awfully close to blackmail. Recalls, if they succeed, solve nothing; special elections cost thousands of dollars and newly elected legislators who come in as part of a recall have no idea what they're up to before they face a regular election in November.

And it seems perverse that local voters could be stampeded by a bunch of noisy activists into reversing course just 17 months later.

Recalls — perhaps especially the one now under way against Dillon — only fuel the kind of hyper-partisan warfare we all have come to hate. Whether you agree with the way he votes or not, Dillon has been an able legislator. He fully deserves to remain in office at least until his term expires in January. And neither he, nor we, should have to put up with any of these silly and obvious recall games.

## Pressure mounting on China to alleviate tensions in Tibet

reat teachers open eyes. That is what my fourth-grade teacher did many years ago for me. She helped me be a life-long learner about all things Chinese. I continue that dream today.

The teacher came to mind as I recently sat in a typical Tibetan yak herder's home. We were a few hours drive outside of Lhasa, the capital of the Tibet autonomous region in China. Tibet is a Buddhist kingdom, part of China that sits on the rooftop of the world at 12,000 feet above sea level.

We arrived at a home in the village of Dangxiong, after a four-hour ride in a minivan that never went faster than 40 mph.

After leaving the highway, we bumped along a dirt road. We passed more yaks and children who seemed to mingle together as naturally as it

together as naturally as if they were from the yak family.

I was taking in the sights and sounds of a yak herder's yard, where I saw what I later learned was yak dung stacked up like firewood and several dogs yelping. The yak-woven covering of the door was thrown open. With Tibetan words rapidly rolling off his tongue, and with a wave of the arm and grasp of our hand in welcome, we were pulled into the yak herder's home. Once inside his home, the yak herder presented me with a "hada." This gift giving is a common practice among Tibetans to express their best wishes. The white hada, a long narrow scarf made of silk, embodies purity and good fortune.

The home was bright, colorful and smelled like "yak." Yaks are an important source of food, clothing, transportation and dung for fuel. Yak tea was poured as our host tossed a couple of extra yak dung chips into the fire to heat the home. We washed our hands in a bowl on the floor filled with mountain stream water.

Soon hot bowls of noodle soup with yak meat appeared, along with a young boy and his two sisters from the kitchen next door. Our yak tea cups never got close to empty. Later, yak cookies and yak dumplings were added to the luncheon mix for variety.

During a break from our meal, I wandered next door to find the "wife," a beautiful Tibetan woman. She was busily making the next part of our meal.

Standing on the Tibetan plateau alongside thousands of yaks, with the wind howling between the mountain ranges, is a grand way to make you realize how large is the world in which we live. We drove away, waving to our new Tibetan friends.

Since returning to Michigan, the roof has been blown off Tibet. The eruption of violence is a stunning show of defiance against 57 years of Chinese rule.

While in Lhasa, my thoughts returned to my mom's old pressure cooker with the little weighted "jiggler" that allowed just enough steam to escape to keep the contraption from exploding. The tension and pressure from the China-Tibet politics has been hissing for decades.

Chinese officials will tell you Tibet has historically been part of China. Their efforts are to bring the Tibetan people out of the dark ages and to enable them to benefit from the Chinese economic boom. The Tibetans will respond that the Chinese military overran their country, and are occupying Tibet with the goal to dilute, if not eliminate, their cultural identity.

The exiled spiritual leader of Tibet, the Dalai Lama, has called what is transpiring in Tibet as "cultural genocide." The Dalai Lama is determined to pursue the "middle-way" policy that "takes into account the benefits to all parties involved, rather than one party alone."

The Dalai Lama is not demanding independence for Tibet, but rather the autonomy promised to practice religion and to maintain cultural heritage. The Dalai Lama has threatened to resign should Tibetans continue to use violence in their protests.

I am fearful for the young Tibetans
I met and left behind on Beijing Street
in front of the Potala. As a freedom-loving nation, we must continue to speak
out about the oppression of the Tibetan
people and call on the leaders of China to
show restraint and open dialogue. Many
have called for a boycott of the Beijing
Olympics. I concur with the Dalai Lama
that this would be ill-advised.

Let's continue to engage China at all levels while putting a spotlight on the concerns of the Tibetans. From the Olympic view, a spotlight will shine on all things Chinese: the good, the bad and the ugly. It is through the lens of engagement that change will take place. If not, as any great teacher will tell you, the pressure cooker will certainly blow.



Thanks to the incredible display of skills he put on at the NFL Draft Combine in February, Thomas's stock has risen faster than fuel prices at the corner gas station.


Some skeptics questioned the ex-Chief's decision to forgo his senior season at MSU for the big bucks of the NFL when he revealed his plans in January.



## BBB warns against small business loan scams

Better Business Bureau officials, citing the current credit crunch, are seeing small businesses forced to search for alternative funding sources. The BBB warns that business owners are becoming victims of fraud when using the Internet for loans and grants.

BBB Serving Eastern Michigan spokesman Tim Burns said, "The scam artists are always looking for a way to take current affairs and events and use them to their advantage. They're working that angle to make an easy buck."

Dishonest lenders can make a Web site look legitimate when it's not, noted Clawson resident Burns. He recommends potential borrowers check with the BBB "to see if there has been a pattern of complaints against them."

He and colleagues have been seeing people having difficult times in this economy. "When they have a hand stretched out to them, they're looking at it as an opportunity."


If you pay upfront, most likely you won't get anything back in return, Burns warned.

Watch out for people who want to avoid normal channels of a loan applications, he said, and watch out for unsecured loans. If you have trouble getting a credit card for your business through traditional channels and then get an offer, "you have to check and see what's going on."

"The Internet provides a perfect stage for fraud because bad actors in the loan industry can easily portray a professional image that provides unsuspecting small business owners with a false sense of trust," Burns said.

Clarence Sanders, who owns an insurance agency in Southfield, signed up for the National Small Business Alliance, a problem area seen recently by the BBB. "They said I had a certain amount of time to study the material. I asked for my money back and never heard another word from them,"

"I would highly recommend they stay



away from it," Sanders said of advice he has for other businesses. He reported his problem to the BBB but didn't get a refund that had been promised.

Following are examples of recent loan and grant offers BBB has identified as taking advantage of small business owners locally and nationwide:

#### **NATIONAL SMALL BUSINESS ALLIANCE**

The BBB has received more than 1,100 complaints from 49 states and the District of Columbia about the National Small Business Alliance (www.natlsba. com). Complainants state they were initially contacted by phone or e-mail and told they were preapproved for a credit line of \$8,000 for a one-time membership fee of \$99 to \$149. Despite what complainants were led to believe by representatives of the company, the "credit line" is not a small business loan, but rather, is collectively comprised of coupons, discounts, and offers made by participating vendors to purchase goods and services such as computers or travel arrangements using credit terms. Complainants say the company continues to deduct money from their bank account without their permission and does not refund money as prom-

The National Small Business Alliance currently has an "Unsatisfactory" rating from the BBB for its continued failure to resolve the pattern of deceptive marketing, misrepresentation, false advertising, and unauthorized debits. BBB advises: Small business own-

ers should be extremely cautious when providing bank account numbers and insist on reviewing all details of any offer before making a buying decision and signing a contract. Prior to entering into an agreement, small owners can always check out a potential creditor, partner or vendor's reliability report with BBB. BBB Reliability ReportsTM are free and available online at www. bbb.org.

"It's more of a coupon for businesses they're associated with," Burns said of the National Small Business Alliance. Those promised a refund locally he's checked with haven't received it.

"That's one example of many that are out there that people should be aware of," Burns said.

#### **CAPITAL FUNDING PROGRAMS, OTHERS**

In 2007, and so far in 2008, BBBs across the U.S. have received hundreds of complaints from small business owners who were burned by online offers to

receive government grant money. Using spam e-mails to drive traffic to professional looking Web sites, fraudulent companies have promised to help small business owners rake in thousands of dollars in government grants to start or expand their businesses. As part of the scheme, small business owners have been required to pay several hundred dollars via wire or money order, but then never heard from the phony com-

Capital Funding Programs (www. capitalfundingprograms.com), purportedly of Champlain, N.Y., is one such company. Since September of 2007, 34 victims from 23 states have filed complaints with the BBB after losing more than \$400 each.

BBB advises: Business'owners can research free information on government grant programs at the U.S. government Web site, www.grants.gov. If a company does qualify for a grant of some type, the U.S. government does not request payment as part of the application review or grant award pro-

"They're not providing anything of value that you couldn't get on your own," Burns said. Don't wire money or send via money order, as such transactions are hard to trace and/or cancel, he recommended.

"Those are the red flags," he said of such transactions. "You should be cau-

"You can talk to one of our consumer agents who can handle inquiries," Burns said. You can also enter company information into the automated system, or look it up on the BBB Web site 24 hours a day.

## Redraft documents, boost funds

Q. I am on a homeowners association and we need our documents revised as they are over 30 years old. Unfortunately, we only collect \$25 a year in assessments. What can we do to correct the situation?

A. Hopefully your documents allow the board to increase the assessment. With such a low annual assessment, the association is not in the position to deal with bylaw enforcement or collection matters,

the board additional latitude with respect to collecting monies to protect the integrity of the community. You should engage in an attorney familiar with community association law to assist you in redrafting your documents, including the ability to increase the revenue for the association.

'Q. Are you aware of a question concerning whether condos, co-ops, etc., are subject to the Michigan business tax classifying the assessments as "gross receipts." and whether it requires the association to pay taxes on it? Do you have any information?

A. The question is up in the air, and preliminary discussions with the state have suggested that it may be wrong in regard to assessing co-ops. As to condos, to the extent that they were incorporated under the 1982 Nonprofit Corporation Act, there may be no wording exempting them from application to the tax. The state has been asked to issue an opinion on this. You are advised to consult and contact your legislators to make sure that condominiums and co-ops are exempt from having to pay any

backup service like MozyHome or Carbonite is that it comes with software that automatically uploads new and changed files.

With basic online storage, there's no synchronization: It's up to you to pick and choose which files to upload, and

Let's say you want to back up your photo library (always a good idea). Services like MediaMax (mediamax.com), ADrive (adrive.com), and MyBloop offer more than enough free storage space for most users (25 gigabytes, 50 gigabytes, and unlimited, respectively).


However, after you perform the initial upload of your photos, it's up to you to remember to add new ones. If you're not diligent about it, this can quickly turn into an organization hassle.

I'm not saying you shouldn't take advantage of these freebie storage options—quite the opposite. But you should be aware of their limitations if you're planning to use them for backup purposes.

You should also be aware that because they're free, they could vanish at any time, taking your files along with them. All the more reason to have multiple backup destinations, as I've discussed the last two weeks running.

Long before he put the shimmer into Detroit's revamped Iridescence restaurant, head chef Adam Hightower knew his career would begin in the kitchen. Growing up in Rochester Hills, Hightower said, he preferred watching Julia Child rather than Saturday morning cartoons. His earliest memory involves cooking up scrambled eggs for his younger brother - when he was just 4. "I grew up around food," said Hightower. "I traveled the world with my parents."

And he discovered early on he wanted to be a chef. After his first trip to his father's native Hawaii, Hightower also knew he intended to live there. Though his family didn't buy into these announcements when he was young - "They laughed," he said - Hightower managed to achieve both.

As a junior attending Rochester Adams High School he simultaneously enrolled in Livonia's Schoolcraft College where he eventually earned his degree in culinary arts. What began as a quest to purchase a car quickly developed into a culinary mission.

## A simple repair? No, it's another recall

ur daughter Hollie moved into a brand new condo just over three years ago in the Walled Lake area and married Virgil, an up-andcoming executive in the business world. He is just a jewel of a guy who has

become very

close to his father-in-law,

which allowed

him to call me

a few days ago

at 6:30 in the

morning.



"Joey, there is no hot water coming out for my morning Joe Gagnon shower. What do I do?'

I said (as any good father-inlaw would): "Virgil, you go to work and I'll come over and fix the problem because it's probably just the thermocouple that has to be replaced.

Most of you know that the thermocouple is the part that the pilot flame hits and keeps the flame constantly on. It costs between \$5 and \$10, is available at all hardware stores and I've changed many in my lifetime. Not a big job at all!

I removed the thermocouple

and it was a big pain. I had to remove the whole burner assembly at the bottom of the hot water heater to get the part out. Once it was removed, I visited a local Home Depot store and went to the plumbing aisle. A nice woman and gentleman told me that my thermocouple was no longer available. They directed me to two hardware stores and a plumbing supply house.

No one stocked this thermocouple. This thermocouple uses a left-handed thread that screws into the gas valve control. I soon learned that all of these thermocouples were recalled from the market throughout the United States.

The next morning, after Virgil and Hollie went through another cold shower, I called some plumber friends who directed me to a company that repairs these American hot water heaters still under warranty. The repairman replaced the whole burner assembly and charged a flat rate of \$125 for service and labor. The parts were covered by the warranty.

Virgil and Hollie now have hot-water again in their condo, but I've been thinking of the other 200 or so condo own-

ers who probably have the same hot water heater in their homes. I'll bet they don't have a clue as to what to do when the problem hits them.

I also four d out that a settlement was approved on Oct. 11, 2007 on a class action lawsuit against Whirlpool, American Hot Water Co., A.O. Smith Corporation, and Lowe's HIW Inc. hot water heaters sold by these companies from 2000 through 2006, which have a defective thermocouple assem-

Imagine six years of producing these hot water heaters. which means several million of them currently in homes across America and homeowners unaware of the problem. Well, you can still get into the class action suit and file a claim but it must be done before June 28, 2008. Contact www.waterheatersettlement.com

At Schoolcraft College, Hightower honed his skills with guidance from teacher and mentor Dan Hugelier. "He's the Michael Jordan of chefs," said Hightower, who crafted his own food philosophy based on Hugelier's motto "Simple food done right." Hightower lives by the adage "Simple food done perfect."

Hugelier said Hightower was simply "born to be a chef," "Beyond his natural gifts, he has heart, is a top rate human being and like a son to me," said Hugelier. "Adam knows how to work past the hurt - a full dining room, board full of tickets, orders backed up, and most people would fold. Adam's the guy that can bail


Hugelier used words like honest, hardworking, sincere and talented to describe the young chef. "Hightower can cook better than most. but never stops wanting to improve," he said. "Simple food done perfect is what any good chef strives for. It takes years to learn it. Fast rising chefs don't know it. They look in the mirror too much, make weird foam and towers of ahi tuna

with strange wasabi glaze. "Adam is a solid cook. Don't expect anything different. I'm very proud of him."

It's true Hightower's not one to follow food fads or trends because, he said, they don't last. "Simple food done perfect will always exist."

Once armed with his degree, Hightower traveled extensively and - at age 21 - took his first executive chef position at The Creek Country Club in Long Island, New York. Never one to stay in one place for long, he moved on to other positions in Florida - first the Boca Raton Country Club and later the Ritz Carlton in Naples.

"Originally my goal was 10 states in 10 years," he said. "I only wanted to work with certified master chefs." **Executive chef Greg Carroll** considers Hightower to be a "cutting edge" chef. "He's very passionate about food," said Carroll. "We're thrilled to death to have him here." He said Hightower excels in preparing seafood and his tapas menu allows the chef "an opportunity to show off."

To Hugelier, Hightower remains "one of the best young chefs to ever work with me." in Macomb Township, the cemeteries have given more than \$500,000 to organizations such as Lutheran Seminaries, Lutheran High School Association, Concordia University in Ann Arbor, and Lutheran Child and Family Services over the last 10 years. He is a member of the chamber of commerce in Livonia and Macomb, and recently volunteered through Livonia for the Here 2 There program of business professionals who speak to students in public high schools about their careers.

Habitz was born and raised by Lutheran parents in Dearborn and attended Emmanuel Lutheran School, Lutheran High School West, Valparaiso University, and Wayne State University College
