Hoover, believed to be in her 60s, died last summer, when another 10 or so cats—some alive, some dead—were removed from what officials have said was a filthy, flea-infested house. Canton typically hires a company called the Varmint Police to remove pets from homes such as Hoover's.

After Hoover's death, Can-

ton building officials and the Wayne County Health Depart-ment conducted an inspection and ruled the house unfit for human habitation. Under township rules, Supervisor Phil Lasloy appointed an in-dependent hearing officer, who issued an opinion order-ing the house's demolition.




